Acute Ophthalmology Services (AOS)	Clinical Leads: Assoc. Prof Anne Brooks Dr Robyn Troutbeck Dr Kristen Wells	The Acute Ophthalmology Service (AOS) sees patients with acute medical eye conditions or with an unclear diagnosis requiring assessment. They work collaboratively with the Emergency Department to provide a pathway for emergency review patients requiring follow-up. Generally AOS patients require 1-3 visits before discharge. If ongoing medical management is required, patients will be referred to the most appropriate specialty clinic.
Corneal Clinic (CORNEA)	Assoc. Prof Mark Daniell	Subspecialty management of severe corneal infections and complex anterior segment disorders including corneal grafting, collagen crosslinking of the cornea and emergency management of corneal perforations.
Education Visual Assessment Clinic (EVAC)	Assoc. Prof Susan Carden	The Education Vision Assessment Clinic reviews Victorian primary and secondary school children with low vision to determine their eligibility for educational support. The clinic works in collaboration with the Victorian State Government Department of Education and Training. Associate Professor Susan Carden is the medical head of the clinic. Specialist teachers, a psychologist and an orthoptist attend the clinic.

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Glaucoma Unit (GIRU)	Dr Catherine Green	Glaucoma is the second leading cause of blindness worldwide. The term 'glaucoma' refers to a complex range of processes resulting in damage to the optic nerve - the nerve that connects the eye to the brain and allows us to see. Early diagnosis and appropriate treatment are vital to prevent progression. As the major referral centre for Victoria, our unit manages both acute and aggressive glaucoma as well as chronic and stable conditions. Investigations involve visual field testing and various scans of the eye and optic nerve. During your appointment, we may discuss a variety treatment options in the form of eye drops, laser or surgery.
Medical Retinal Clinic (MED RET)	Dr Alex Harper	Subspecialty management of retinal diseases.
Neuro-Ophthalmology Clinic (NOC)	Dr Neil Shuey	The neuro-ophthalmology clinic assesses and manages rather complex patients with neurological visual disturbances. Examples of the more common disorders seen in the clinic include optic neuritis (frequently related to multiple sclerosis), temporal arteritis, idiopathic intracranial hypertension and ocular myasthenia as well as a range of other neurological conditions causing visual disturbances including double vision. The neuro-ophthalmology clinic is

		frequently asked to consult on patients with unexplained visual loss after extensive evaluation in other ophthalmology clinics at the hospital.
Ocular Diagnostic Clinic (ODC)	Dr Marc Sarossy	The clinic performs complex electrophysiological and psychophysical testing such as electroretinography (ERG) to assist in the diagnosis and monitoring of retinal and optic nerve diseases. These diseases rare or pose a diagnostic dilemma for the referring clinicians and usually have a degenerative or inherited basis.
Ocular Genetics Clinic	Dr Jonathan Ruddle	Exists to provide subspecialty expertise to patients and families with genetic eye disease. It is a multidisciplinary clinic with ophthalmologists and geneticists and genetic counsellors present. Referrals are received from Optometrists and Ophthalmologists both from within and outside RVEEH. Genetic testing where appropriate is organised from this clinic and results discussed at review several months later. Conditions assessed include retinal dystrophies including RP and macula dystrophy, hereditary glaucoma and cataract and wider system disorders with specific ocular effects such as Stickler or Marfan syndromes.
Ocular Immunology Clinic (OIC)	Assoc. Prof Lyndell Lim	The Ocular Immunology Clinic, alongside the Ocular Rheumatology Clinic, provides multidisciplinary subspecialty care for complex inflammatory diseases of the eye. Our team consists of Ophthalmologists who are sub-

		specialists in ocular inflammatory diseases, Rheumatologists, Immunologists and clinical nurse specialists. Patients of the Clinic are also given the opportunity to participate in Local and International Clinical Research Trials, through our close collaboration with the Centre for Eye Research Australia, often involving new treatments or treatment paradigms.
Ocular Motility Clinic (OMC)	Dr Lionel Kowal	Surgical and non-surgical treatment of adults and children with developmental, neurological and other problems affecting vision including misaligned eyes; lazy eye; double vision; nystagmus and thyroid eye disease.
Ocular Oncology Clinic	Dr John McKenzie	Management of intraocular and adnexal malignancies of the eye.
Orbito Plastic and Lacrimal Unit (OPAL)	Assoc. Prof Alan McNab	Management of disorders of the orbit (thyroid eye disease, tumours, infections, trauma, inflammations), eyelids (all disorders including tumours, malposition's, congenital anomalies), tear duct system or lacrimal system (obstructions, tumours) and the anophthalmic socket (eye removal and artificial eye socket surgery).
3 Special Clinic	Assoc. Prof Anne Brooks	The 3 Special Clinic treats complex eye conditions.
Surgical Ophthalmology Service (SOS)	Dr Anton van Heerden	The Surgical Ophthalmic Service (SOS) Clinic manages all aspects of Cataract Surgery including pre-operative assessment, cataract surgery, cataract surgery training and post-op management. Cataract surgery is the most commonly performed surgery at RVEEH. We aim

		to provide a modern, efficient and stream-lined cataract surgery service. We also manage other anterior segment surgeries such as pterygium and eyelid surgeries.
Victorian Aboriginal Health Service Specialist Eye Clinic (VAHS)	Assoc. Prof Susan Carden Dr Rosie Dawkins	The Victorian Aboriginal Health Services Specialist Eye Clinic (VAHS) is situated in VAHS, 186 Nicholson Street, Fitzroy, Victoria, 3065. The aim of the clinic is to fit in with the other medical clinics present at VAHS, while being an outreach service of RVEEH. The aim is thus to "promote, improve and support" the ophthalmic care of "the person, the family and the Community in a culturally appropriate way". Ophthalmology clinics run twice per month and are open to babies, children and adults. Referrals can be made from within any hospital or community in Australia.
Vitreo-Retinal Clinic (VRU)	Assoc. Prof Penelope Allen	Subspecialty investigation and management of surgical retinal diseases, including retinal tears, retinal detachment, proliferative diabetic retinopathy, vitreous haemorrhage, endophthalmitis, posterior segment trauma and macular conditions such as macular holes, epiretinal membranes and vitreomacular traction. The Vitreo-Retinal Unit is active in Australia wide audit of its results in full thickness Macular Hole surgery; Retinal Detachment surgery and the development of emerging surgery for Vitreo-Retinal diseases.
